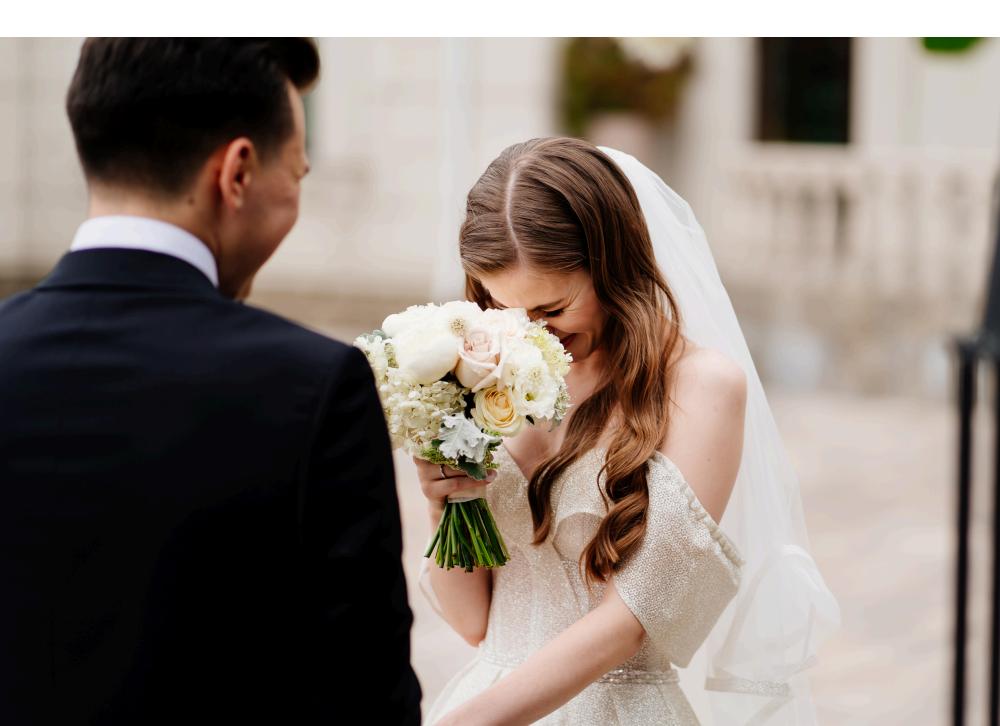
# A Classic & Romantic Vow Structure Perfect for couples who want a timeless, heartfelt approach.

#### **Outline:**

- Begin with an introduction, a first sentence that acknowledges your partner and what you're about to do
- · Include how you met or your first impression of each other

- · Share a memory or moment when you knew they were "the one"
- Make promises for your future
- End with a powerful, emotional closing line

### **Outline:**

- Begin with an introduction, a first sentence that acknowledges your partner and what you're about to do
- Mention your partner's quirks or shared inside jokes
- Acknowledge real-life moments (the good and the messy)
- Share what makes them your perfect match
- Make a mix of serious and silly promises
- End with something personal and unique

# A Poetic & Introspective Vow Structure

Ideal for artistic or sentimental couples who love to express themselves deeply.

#### **Outline:**

- Begin with an introduction, a first sentence that acknowledges your partner and what you're about to do
- Use imagery or metaphors to describe your love
- Reflect on your emotional journey
- Highlight spiritual or soul-level connection
- Focus on forever in a poetic or lyrical way

#### **Example Template:**

You are the calm in my storm, the sunrise after every long night.

Loving you has taught me \_\_\_\_\_ and shown me \_\_\_\_\_.

Your presence is a home I never knew I needed.

I vow to hold space for your dreams, your fears, and your joy.

With every step we take together, I will choose you — in stillness and chaos, in sunlight and shadow.

My heart is yours, now and always.





# Additional Tips

#### Start Early — Like, Really Early

- 6–12 months before the wedding
- Why: The best vows aren't rushed. They come from reflection, shared moments, and small realizations that happen over time. Starting early gives room for honest thoughts to simmer and grow into something truly meaningful.
- Pro Tip: Create a "vow journal" or notes app folder to jot down thoughts as they come up.

#### • Write for Your Person, Not for the Audience

- It's easy to get caught up trying to sound profound or funny, but the most touching vows speak directly to your partner. This is a private moment, even if everyone's watching.
- Ask yourself:
  - What do I want them to feel when I say this?
  - What is something only they will truly understand?

#### Include Real-Life Promises

- Authenticity is key. Go beyond "I promise to love you forever" and include things like:
  - "I promise to always make you coffee just the way you like it.", "I promise to be your calm when you're anxious.", "I promise to laugh at your dad jokes, even when they're terrible."

#### Edit with Your Heart, Not Just Your Head

- Practice saying it out loud. Does it feel natural?
   Does it sound like you?
- If something feels off or overdone, cut it. If something makes you tear up when you read it out loud — keep it.

#### • Practice. But Don't Memorize

- Practice reading your vows aloud so you're comfortable, but don't stress about memorizing them. It's okay to bring a printed card or small booklet (you'll keep this forever!).
- Pro Tip: Practice in front of a mirror or a trusted friend a week before the wedding. You'll get used to hearing your own words and manage nerves better on the day.
